Imataro Kume Home On Sacramento St. Hit by Flames

Two fires caused considerable damage to Japanese buildings Monday and Tuesday in San Francisco.

Fire from an unknown source broke out from the basement of the home of Imataro Kume, 3060 Sacramento St. Monday about midnight, practically wiping out the building.

Awakened by a neighboring American, the family of Mr. Kume had just barely time to escape, leaving all their household valuables to be destroyed to ashes.

The home of K. Ichiyasu, which joins the building, and several other Japanese residences in the vicinity escaped damage although much concern was felt for their safety at one time during the conflagration.

The other fire occurred Tuesday afternoon about 9 o'clock when the upper portion of the Olympia hotel, 108 South Park, was burnt by flames that came from the adjoining building, an American apartment house, which was destroyed.

The proprietor of the hotel, S. Moreno, was away during the fire. While city fire fighters managed to throttle the flames before they spread further, the damage suffered by the Japanese hotel is estimated at \$3000.

"However, I feel that the boycott was a boomerang, and that the Chinese are suffering from their own action, for in many cases the Japanese products were the only cheap ones for the Chinese people."

Here on his first assignment in America, Orames has just completed twenty months in charge of the Chinese territory of the Salvation army.

This phenomenon, which is attributed to the desire on the part of the girls to be able to support themselves in the event of necessity, is a new trend in decided contrast to that of the previous years when few girls wished to enter college.

Statistics for the First Tokyo Prefectural Girls' high school may be taken as a typical example. The school has a graduating class of 220 students out of which 130 are entering colleges, 30 wishing to get jobs, the rest, 60, are to stay at their homes.
