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## 2 S. F. FIRES CAUSE LOSS TO JAPANESE

### Imataro Kume Home On Sacramento St. Hit by Flames

Two fires caused considerable damages to Japanese buildings Monday and Tuesday in San Francisco. Fire from an unknown source broke out from the basement of the home of Imataro Kume, 3060 Sacramento st. Monday about midnight, practically wiping out the building.

Awakened by a neighboring American, the flames of the fire spread but barely time to escape, leaving all their household valuables to be destroyed to ashes.

The home of K. Ichiyasu, which adjoins the building, and several other Japanese residences in the vicinity escaped damage although much concern was felt for their safety at one time during the conflagration.

The other fire occurred Tuesday afternoon about 3 o'clock when the upper portion of the Omiya hotel, 108 South Park, was burnt by flames that came from the adjoining building, an American apartment house, which was destroyed.

The proprietor of the hotel, S. Morino, was away during the fire. While city fire fighters managed to throttle the flames before they spread further, damage suffered by the Japanese hotel is estimated at \$3000.

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, Mar. 9.—A new phenomenon has made its appearance in the literary world of Japan. The publishers and book-sellers have come to find that books pertaining to the ideas of Marx and Kautsky and the left wing movement are no longer popular. On the other hand books on Fascism have come to be extremely popular.

## PEACE HOPE AROUSED IN CHINA WAR

### Japan Okehs League's Plan as Basis For Truce

SHANGHAI, Mar. 9.—(UP)—The Japanese civil and military authorities at Shanghai are prepared to negotiate for peace on the terms of the League Assembly's Resolution of Mar. 4, Mamoru Shigemitsu, Japanese Minister, notified the Chinese.

The notification was sent through Sir Miles Lampson, British Minister. Shigemitsu added that in view of the matter of urgent necessity to reach at the earliest possible date a definite agreement for complete cessation of hostilities, and then discuss arrangements for the withdrawal of the Japanese forces.

The Chinese Government considered the way now open for beginning negotiations. The government was understood to be notifying W. W. Yen, its Geneva representative, of China's readiness to enter such negotiations.

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## Jogakko Grads Seek To Enter Colleges

TOKYO, Mar. 9.—In their earnest desire to achieve higher education, about half of this year's graduates of Jogakko, or high schools, are planning to continue their studies in institutions of higher learning. It was pointed out by the education office today.

This phenomenon, which is attributed to the desire on the part of the girls to be able to support themselves in the event of necessity, is a new trend in decided contrast to that of the previous years when few girls wished to enter colleges.

Statistics for the first Tokyo Prefectural Girls' high school may be taken as a typical example. The school has a graduating class of 290 students out of which 130 are entering colleges, 30 wishing to get jobs, the rest, 60, are to stay at their homes.

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## Big Japan Banks Suspend Payment

Ed Wing, Elmer Skillcorn, and George Willis, all local high school varsity veterans, found themselves at a loss before the power shown by the Japanese defense.

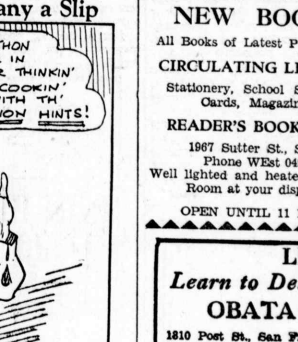
