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RUSS OKEHS PRES. PU YI'S R.R. ENVOYS

Tokyo Thinks Action
Prelude to Actual
Recognition

BY THE UNITED PRESS

TOKYO, Mar. 15 — News from Manchuria today led Japanese officials to express the belief that Soviet Russia will soon recognize officially the new Manchurian state under the dictatorship of Henry Pu Yi, former Chinese emperor.

A dispatch to the Rengo News Agency from Changchun, capital of the new state, said Russia informally indicated it would accept Dictator Pu Yi's nominees for directors of the Chinese Eastern railway, instead of directors appointed by the Chinese National government at Nanking.

This, Pu Yi's followers were reported as saying would be equivalent to a de facto recognition of the new regime. The Chinese Eastern railway is jointly operated by Russia and China.

Manchuria Seeks
U. S. Recognition

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15 — A bid for the recognition of the State of Manchuria has been made to the state department by Shih Chieh Shih, in a telegram in which he signs himself as foreign minister of the new state.

State department officials declined to make public the text of the message, saying unofficially its publication would give the status of an official document to the message.

The communication was lengthy and outlined the history of the state and urged the establishment of diplomatic relations between the United States and Manchuria.

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CLUES HELD IN KILLING OF Y. NAKAE

\$500 Reward Will Be
Given For Arrest
Of Culprit

PENRYN, Mar. 15—Convincing clues that may ensue and carry to the gallows the villainous culprit who murdered the prominent Japanese grower, Yoshichika Nakae, near his home in Newcastle about midnight Mar. 6, were unearthed by Mr. Iwasaki an interpreter and close friend of the murdered man, during a special investigation conducted Sunday.

With \$500 reward posted for the capture of the felon, and with a private detective of much ability engaged to work in cooperation with the police here to hound out every additional clue, both by the authorities and Iwasaki expressed complete confidence that the arrest will be made shortly.

Contrary to the belief held by the police, Interpreter Iwasaki, who is now the central figure in the search for the murderer, declares the crime to be the work of a white person, not a Japanese.

The late Nakae was killed by a blow struck with the butt end of a shotgun or some other blunt weapon while on his way home in the dark of the night. Evidently he left his automobile to look at an obstructing wire that crossed his path, when suddenly he was struck from behind, crushing his skull. The crime was evidently carefully planned and premeditated.

MEMBERS OF TOWNSHIP
TO PROTECT TOKYO IN EMERGENCIES

TOKYO, Mar. 15—A civilian defense force of 600,000 men and women to be mobilized in emergencies either in the form of a natural catastrophe such as a major earthquake or an air invasion, is being planned by the joint leadership of the Municipal office, the Prefectural office, the Metropolitan Police board, the Tokyo Defense headquarters and the Tokyo Gendarmerie corps.

400,000 For Tokyo
The defense force of Tokyo city proper, it is expected will be about 400,000.

Including the suburban districts, the entire force will be about 600,000.

The need of such a body of men and women who will be trained to take charge of any emergency that might arise, and thus prevent the

citizens of Tokyo from falling into confusion, has been strongly felt since the Manchurian conflict and more recently since the opening of hostilities in Shanghai.

To Police City

The work of the civil defense force will cover the defense and policing engineering, medical aid, distribution of foodstuffs, transportation and finances, each department being controlled by expert officials.
