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KOGO STUCK UP, PUT IN CELLAR JAIL

Japanese Suit Man is Robbed of \$23 By Fake Call

Being held up at pistol point, robbed of \$23 in cash, then imprisoned in a dark storage room at 65 Buena Vista street was the harrowing experience of S. Kogo, a suit cleaner of 155 Waller street, Tuesday afternoon.

Kogo went to the apartment house at Buena Vista in response to a telephone call for a suit cleaning order about 2 o'clock. At the doorway of the apartment, he was met by a white man about six feet tall, who escorted him inside.

Taken to Basement
Arriving in the hall way, Kogo was suddenly confronted with a revolver and told to go quietly. The holdup man took him to the basement where he cooly searched Kogo, relieving him of all his money, then locked him up in the storage room.

With a final flourish of his gun, the stickup man warned Kogo to keep quiet. Immediately after being shut up, Kogo started pounding on the door, shouting at the top of his voice.

Released by Postman
Hearing the commotion, a postman who chanced to be passing, brought the manager of the apartment house, who unlocked the door of Kogo's prison after about twenty minutes.

Police arrived but their search proved futile. Kogo described the culprit as being about 30 years of age, having dark hair, wearing a dark suit, with a tough appearance. When given a chance to look over the pictures in the rogue's gallery Kogo failed to point out his man.
