"The Japanese hawks program instituted by a certain Sunset district paper was just a bedtime story, a boogey and nothing more," Yoshitaro Chotki, a resident of the Sun-set district, living at 1463 Eighth avenue, told the Nichi-Bei Repre-

"In fact, it was my family that the venomous editorial was directed against. At first I felt highly insulted but when I considered that the editor of that paper was a bit behind his time, it never troubled me at all."

I reported the incident to the Japanese consulate and showed them a copy of the paper. The consuls advised me to keep quiet on the subject and avoid developments.

However, I did take the precaution to ask for special protection from the police department, which the gladly promised me.

"I have been told that I have a basis for a slander suit that might cause considerable embarrassment to the editor of that paper; but since I have no desire to make trouble, I am content to let them alone."

"What mystifies me is how you newspaper men find out things so well," Chotki concluded with a chuckle.

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SAC'TO STRAWBERRIES
Delayed Two Weeks

SACRAMENTO, Mar. 21—Due to the wet weather prevailing in this region this year, the early crop of strawberries will be delayed about two weeks. The first shipments are expected to be made about the first of April.

JAPAN HOP PLANE CARRIES
7000 LBS. IN TEST FLIGHT

NEW YORK, Mar. 21—Two Japanese army officers, Captain V. Nagoya and Seargent K. Asha announced today that they would attempt to fly the Pacific within thirty days for the \$25,000 prize offered by the Tokyo newspaper, Hochi Shinbun.

Load test flights were made this afternoon in the new monoplane they have purchased.

The ship, with a 450 horse power motor and a gasoline capacity of 110 gallons, took the air with a dead weight of 7000 pounds.
