Nagai Thinks Action Of Government Unjust

After faithfully serving the United States government for a period over twelve years in the capacity of steward, the last six years aboard the U. S. Geodetic survey ship, Guide, which is now tied up in Oakland, it was the fate of Manzo Nagai, who is now residing at 1844 Buchanan street in this city to be summarily dismissed without cause Monday.

There were four Japanese signed for service aboard the Guide and there was only one remaining, Kanetada Yamada, a Seattle boy, who is commonly known as Kelley Yamada, a citizen.

The three Japanese, including Nagai, were discharged Monday for the reason that non-citizens were dismissed from government service by an order issued from Washington, D. C.

A Norwegian cook aboard the same ship as Nagai who has been in service for over 16 years was also dismissed with the Japanese. It seems to be the universal feeling of those discharged that they have been the victims of gross injustice. An appeal for a reconsideration on their cases has been sent to Washington.
