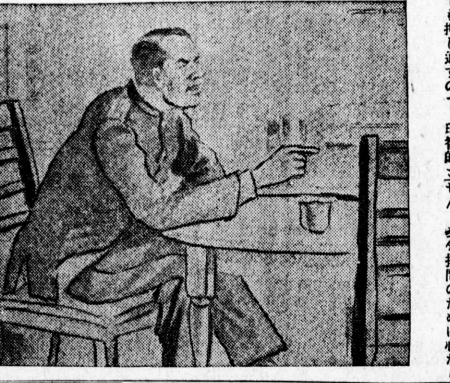

OYAMA SAYS FASCISM IN JAPAN TO DIE

Labor Leader and Ex-Member of Diet is S. F. Visitor

The Fascist movement in Japan will eventually die out, was the prophetic forecast by Ikuo Oyama, one of the best known political figures in present day Japan who arrived here Wednesday on the N. Y. K. liner, Chichibu. He was accompanied by his wife. Oyama declares himself retired from active politics. He was at one time the leader of the Farmer-Labor party in the Diet, having served a number of terms in the lower house. His party is decidedly opposed to the Fascists.

Predicts Fascist Fall
"The farmers, laborers and the lower class absorb Fascism as a thirsty man drinks water," pointed out Oyama, "they are gaining power with leaps and bounds; but, they will 'flip.' At present they are flying a flag in glory like a beautiful sky-rocket but they will fall to earth like all spent sky-rockets and nobody will notice them."

Oyama was given a welcome by the Waseda alumni association Wednesday evening at the Nippon club. About the same time in the Japanese community, a group of anti-Oyamites were circulating hand bills denouncing Oyama as a traitor to the lower class because he poses as a savior when actually he is the mouthpiece of capitalism.

On Tour

When confronted with one of the hand bills, Oyama merely laughed and jokingly remarked, "I have enemies already in San Francisco."

Before his advent in public life, Oyama was a professor of public life, economy and philosophy at Waseda. He occupied a chair from 1914 until 1925 when he took an active part in the Farmer-labor movement.

He is on a tour of the United States with his wife. He will travel the East coast and may take a trip to Europe where he is well known.

JAPAN JOINS HANDS WITH FRANCE AT ARMS PARLEY

K. Okemoto Directs Program for Picnic By Sac'to Society

Geneva, Apr. 14—Italy, Brazil, and Turkey lined up yesterday with the United States and Great Britain in proposing abolition of the aggressive arms of modern warfare. Japan threw her weight to the opposition, joining hands with France, and the lesser European powers. Seconded by Brazil backing the American proposals advanced by Ambassador Hugh S. Gibson, Foreign Minister Grandi of Italy presented a plan for progressive reduction of land armaments in three stages: naval disarmament by destruction of battleships, airplane carriers and submarines, and a vague plan for fixing limits of aerial strength. The Brazilian delegate seconded the American plan, while Turkey's representative added a suggestion for the control of the manufacture of armaments. Sato Backs Tardieu Naotake Sato, Japanese representative, general sided with Premier Tardieu of France in opposing Ambassador Gibson. He insisted on simultaneous discussion of land, sea, and air disarmament and demanded measures for controlling reduction. His principle grievance was against powerful airplane carriers.

Kaname Wakasugi, Japanese consul general, will deliver an address on the Sino-Japanese conflict in Shanghai and Manchuria at a lecture meeting to be held Friday evening, Apr. 15, 8 p. m., at the Gyosei auditorium, Octavia and Pine sts. The lecture is being sponsored by the San Francisco Japanese association.

Shanghai Rocked by Another War Scare

SHANGHAI, Apr. 14—Shanghai today following reports that the full of "war scares" again yes the Japanese military shortly will issue another ultimatum to the Chinese army because of Chinese troop movements in the vicinity of Lungshu and Pootung. Mayor Wu Te-Chen ordered double police patrols in Nan-tai, the native section south of the French concession, when he received information that 2,000 plainclothes gunmen plan to seize control of the district.

PLOT SEEN IN JAPAN TROOP TRAIN CRASH

Tokyo Blames Soviet For Wreck that Killed 12

TOKYO, April 14—Dispatches from Harbin, Manchuria, in several Japanese newspapers hinted ominously today of Soviet Russian responsibility in the wreck of a Japanese troop train, near Harbin, Tuesday night. They described the bitterness of the Japanese army in north Manchuria against "a certain country," but the cause of the wreck, in which two officers and twelve men were killed and more than fifty injured remained a mystery. The war office version attributed the wreck to the removal of spikes from several rails, causing seventeen of the train's fifty cars to leave the track and plunge down a twenty-foot embankment.

LOS ANGELES, Apr. 14—Kiyoshi Nishikawa, a 43-year-old former barber shop owner near 15th and Broadway in Taoma, is held on suspicion of having murdered his wife, Jimmie, 36, who was found dead near the family bath room with a .38 caliber bullet in the center of her breast about 2 p. m. Tuesday. The circumstances of Mrs. Nishikawa's death indicate that it may have been a suicide, but due to the fact that the pistol was found in another room, removed from the victim's body, Nishikawa is being held at headquarters. According to Nishikawa's story, he was at a neighbor's home at the time of her death, it was revealed at the inquest which was held Wednesday afternoon. He said that a shot rang out, and immediately he rushed home to find his wife on death's doorway by a self-inflicted wound. After calling a doctor, he picked up the pistol and carried it to the bed room where the police discovered it on a dresser. The Nishikawas came to Los Angeles about 3 months ago from Taoma.
