

## ROW EVOKED BY BOOK ON ASIA CRISIS

### Kawakami Book Goes Through 5 Large Editions

NEW YORK CITY, April 15.—K. R. Kawakami's new book "China Speaks on the Sino-Japanese Crisis" (Macmillan) which has gone through five large editions in four weeks and is one of the best selling non-fiction books of this season, has created something of a feud among the Japanese in America, especially on the Pacific Coast. According to some Japanese language newspapers, the book is likely to become a political issue at the coming session of the Diet, the Japanese legislature.

#### Shanghai Blunder

The hullabaloo was started because Kawakami said in the book that Japan's "single-handed intervention" at Shanghai was a "blunder" of the first magnitude. Some Japanese papers are attacking the author as unpatriotic while others are lauding him for his courage and independence of opinion. Kawakami claims that there is nothing objectionable in that phrase if it is read and understood in the light of the context. The majority of the Japanese press in this country seem to be agreed that the book is an excellent exposition of the Japanese viewpoint and perhaps the most comprehensive and understandable explanation of the Sino-Japanese situation from the Japanese standpoint.

#### Demand Apology

On the other hand, some papers insist that the author should apologize to the Japanese army and navy. They also blame the Prime Minister Tauroguchi for wanting the introduction to the book "Does the Premier," they ask, "endorse Mr. Kawakami's views on the Shanghai intervention, and if so how could he remain in power?"

The Y. M. B. A. will sponsor a Mother-Daughter banquet on May 21. Clara Iwasaki was elected to act as social chairman.


