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DEBUCHI CUP AT STAKE IN SUMO CLASH

Inter-City Meet Will Be Held May 29 In San Jose

A handsome prize trophy donated by Katsuj Debuchi, Japanese ambassador to Washington, will be awarded the winning team at a huge inter-city sumo tournament to be staged in San Jose May 29, under the auspices of the Northern California Sumo association.

This decision was made at a conference of delegates convening in San Francisco Thursday afternoon at the San Francisco Japanese association hall. Delegates were present from San Jose, Fresno, San Francisco, and Sacramento.

DEATH ENDS WIFE KILLER

Filipino Who Slayed White Woman Is Hanged

SAN QUENTIN, Apr. 16—While his little 2-year-old daughter played happily in the warden's office, Treco Lacang, 31, Filipino, went to his death on the San Quentin prison gallows yesterday, only a few yards away from her. Lacang murdered his white wife, Ethel, because of her alleged relations with a Japanese rancher, who was Lacang's employer.

Lacang was tried in Fresno eighteen months ago. The little girl came to the prison to attend the hanging with Felipe Esteban and his wife, a Filipino couple from Fresno who adopted her after her mother was slain. Warden Holahan refused to permit the Estebans to witness the execution. Lacang went to his death protesting that he had the right to kill his wife because she had been "unfaithful."

Giant 20-Ton Plane Passes Naval Test

OSAKA, Apr. 17—The Navy's giant seaplane, No. 90-2, weighing 20 tons with full load, underwent a perfect test flight at Koehlin beach, manned by Capt. Nakamura and Capt. Sumusu. These fliers were dispatched for the trial flight from the Army's Experimental Station of the Yokosuka Naval base.

Nichiren Church to Sponsor Movie Show "Captain Nakamura"

A movie showing the assassination of Captain Nakamura that formed the immediate cause for the Sino-Japanese outbreak near Mukden will be exhibited at the local Kinmon gakuen auditorium Saturday and Sunday, Apr. 16 and 17, under the auspices of the Nichiren Kyo Kai.

The film "Captain Nakamura," which received much favorable comment in Japan, pictures the adventures of this Japanese army officer in the wilds of Manchuria where he was killed by a band of soldier bandits. He had been sent to investigate conditions there by the Japanese general staff.

YOKOHAMA, Apr. 16—Instead of joy and happiness, the friends and relatives of Captain K. Nagaya will meet the Shizuka Maru on her arrival here from Seattle with tear-dimmed eyes and sadness as they greet K. Asai, who is bearing the ashes of the late Capt. Nagaya with him.

It had been the plan of Asai and Capt. K. Nagaya to set a Bellanca monoplane down in the Tokyo airport April 23 after a flight from Seattle on the first West East spanning of the Pacific.

IN MANCHURIA TOKYO, Apr. 16—The Japanese army is ready to abandon operations near the Manchurian-Siberian border to relieve tension between Japan and Soviet Russia, a government spokesman said today.

Many Ex-Californians Members of Tokyo Ria Society

TOKYO, Apr. 16—One of the most unique clubs in Japan is connected with the local Y. W. C. A. It is made up entirely of young second generation American girls. The club is called the Ria club, deriving its name from the first letter of the phrase, "raised in America."

This club was organized in November by former Los Angeles girls who met at the Y.W.C.A. in Tokyo. Since its organization the membership has enlarged, and now it includes girls who came from Seattle, Sacramento, Denver, and other cities: Miss Susu Masuda, Los Angeles Junior College graduate and prominent M.E. Church girl, is treasurer of the club.

Other girls whose names are known to residents of Los Angeles are: Yaeiko and Masako Kusayanagi, Shizu and Hana Kawai, Pauline and Hisa Masuda, and Lillian and Alice Katayama. From Long Beach came Michi and Martha Shimizu. The only Sacramento girl is Ruth Oki. There are many other girls.

Among the activities of this club were mostly social doings. The group is planning to give an operetta some time in May with an all-feminine cast.

White Russians are Suspected as Cause Of Train Disaster

TOKYO, Japan, April 16—Investigation of a train wreck at Harbin, Manchuria, in which a number of Japanese soldiers were killed or injured early this week has convinced the government of Japan that Soviet Russia was in no way concerned.

The cause of the wreck has not been determined, a government spokesman said today, but the investigators suspect it was the work of "White" Russians hoping to embarrass Japan and Russia in a dispute. It was reported there will be a joint investigation by Japanese and Russian authorities.

Fujimoto is a leading business man and president of the Kyo Ai Kai. All members of the Y. M. A. as well as members of the council Kyo Ai Kai and many distinguished local Japanese citizens attended.

The welcome was given by Peter Fujimoto, Henry Okuma, president of the Y. M. A. responded in behalf of his organization. Many vocal and instrumental selections were rendered by talented members.

JAPAN NOT TO JOIN PARLEY

League Assembly To Discuss Sino-Japan Brawl

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, Apr. 16—The Japanese government today instructed its Geneva delegation to deal with the entire League of Nations assembly committee of nineteen, appointed to deal with the Sino-Japanese conflict.

The league assembly appointed the committee of nineteen after it has approved a three point program for peaceful settlement of the conflict a month ago.

These three points were a declaration that agreements reached by military pressure would not be recognized, an assertion upholding China's thesis that the assembly was competent to deal with the entire Far Eastern question, and provision for supervising peace-making problems throughout the committee of nineteen.

Personnel of Japan Equestrian Team to Olympic Announced

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, Apr. 16—The personnel of the Japanese equestrian team to the Xth World Olympiad in Los Angeles were announced today by the Japan Equestrian society, upon official notification from the army regarding the selection of the horsemen.

The line-up includes: Colonel Kohji Tsuchi, coach; Major Yasuhide Imamura, and Captains Shigetomo Yoshida and Takeichi Nishi, for the steeple chase; Major Shunzo Kido and Captain Taro Hara and Moritahige Yamamoto, for combined race.

The Japanese horsemen will sail from Yokohama May 12th aboard the N.Y.K. Asama Maru.

Prior to their departure, the 12 horses to be used in the races will be shipped from Yokohama on April 22 by the N.Y.K. Toba Maru, in the care of veterinary surgeons and bootlers. Major Kido is commander in charge of the transportation.

JAPANESE FLEE

HARBIN, Manchuria, Apr. 16—Japanese refugees were reported today to be fleeing into the Soviet territory at and near Vladivostok as the result of renewed activity of Chinese guerrillas near the Manchurian city of Pogranichnaya.

\$25,000 SUBSCRIBED FOR RELIEF SAYS K. WAKASUGI

Pleasant surprise was expressed by Consul General Kaname Wakasugi over the whole-hearted support given by the Japanese residents on the Pacific coast who subscribed some \$25,000 for relief of the wounded Japanese soldiers in Shanghai, in a letter delivered Friday evening at the local Gyosei auditorium, Octavia and Pine sts. The address was sponsored by the local Japanese association.

NEW NATION IS LED BY NIPPON BOY

Leader of Manchukuo Touched by Letter From Osaka

OSAKA, Apr. 16—"Never before have I been inspired so greatly as when I received a letter of goodwill and cheer from a little Japanese 'ambassador' in Osaka."

So saying Foreign Minister Hsieh Chieh-shih of the Manchurian Republic recently handed a letter of thanks to a correspondent of the Osaka Mainichi, asking him to convey it to the boy by air mail.

The "little Japanese ambassador" is Tadayuki Miyochi, 12, sixth year grade pupil of the First Keihatsu Primary school in Osaka. Finds Boy's Letter.

Since the recent founding of the Republic of Great Manchuria, telegrams and letters of congratulation and encouragement from Japan have been literally pouring into the Government.

Upon opening one of the envelopes, the Manchurian foreign minister found a letter from little Tadayuki. It reads:

"I am so glad to hear of the birth of the new state. I sincerely congratulate you upon the founding of the Republic of Great Manchuria with Mr. Pu Yi, ex-Emperor of China, as its Chief Executive. Your Excellency, I am sure, is one of those who have contributed in no small measure toward the birth of the new state.

"I like the Manchurian Republic very much and hope that it will come in the near future one of the great powers of the world. Your country and our nation must go on forever as the most friendly states. When I become a man, I intend to go to your land together with my fellow countrymen to promote friendship with the present second generation in your state.

"I believe that there is much work before you in the future, and hope that you will work for the cause of my heart for your country. Please remember, however, that you must take great care of your health."

Greatly moved by the letter, Foreign Minister Hsieh Chieh-shih immediately wrote a letter of thanks in person and asked the Osaka Mainichi correspondent to see that it was delivered to the boy in Osaka.

In compliance with his request, the letter was forwarded to the Osaka Mainichi Office in Osaka by air mail and handed to the lad a few days ago.

The letter, written in Japanese by the Minister, read:

"Let me thank you from the bottom of my heart for your congratulatory letter. Understanding that you are doing well in your school, I congratulate you. I am sure your parents are proud of you.

"Our country has just been founded, we are extremely busy and have little time to express our appreciation for each of the telegrams and letters pouring into our office from the Japanese people.

Your letter was so inspiring. When I received your letter, however, I could not but reply at once, so inspiring and encouraging it was. I thank you again for your deep understanding of the mission of our state.

"Through your letter, I realized how sympathetic you people are toward our country and how deep is their understanding of our land. The existence of understanding between the two countries is a matter for hearty congratulation to both."

In conclusion, the letter expressed the hope that the boy will come to Manchuria after he has grown up and assist in the forming of good bonds between Japan and Manchurian state.
