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PILOT TO HOP FROM S. F. TO TOKYO IN MAY

Yoshihara Will Span Pacific in 2 or 3 Flights

Self Yoshihara, the "Japanese Lindbergh," is scheduled to arrive in San Francisco next month to prepare for a new attempt to span the Pacific by airplane, according to advices received Friday from Seiji Noma, president of the newspaper Hochi Shimbun in Tokyo.

Yoshihara attempted last spring to fly from Japan to the United States, but his plane was wrecked by rough seas at Muroran bay, in the Kuriles. In 1930 he completed a flight across Europe and Siberia under the sponsorship of the newspaper.

The aviator plans to make the Pacific flight in two or three hops, using a seaplane. No date for the attempt has been fixed.

4 Die, Forty Hurt In Shizuoka Fire

TOKYO, Apr. 22—Four persons died today, forty were injured and 6,000 were left homeless in a fire that wiped out the greater part of Omiya, town in the prefecture of Shizuoka, seventy-five miles southwest of Tokyo. The flames destroyed 1,200 houses.

The fire started last night in a cafe and burned most of the night. It destroyed the city hall, police headquarters, banks, hospital and principal business buildings. Omiya's population is 20,000.

(Special to Japanese American News) TOKYO, Apr. 22—Madame Tamaki Miura, Japan's wandering songbird, and the first Japanese prima donna to win international fame, is coming home for a visit this summer after an unbroken absence of nearly 11 years.

Madame Butterfly, as she is often referred to here, has left Milano on the Terukuni Maru on Apr. 18, and is scheduled to reach Yokohama on May 23.

She will remain in Japan for about three months, during which she will give a number of concerts in the leading cities through out the country.

Home Three Months Her first concert will be offered either at the Tokyo theatre or the Hibiyu public hall in the latter part of May. Her accompanist is already in Tokyo.

The popular mind in Japan has come to surround Madame Miura with an aura of tragedy. The once young talented singer who left her husband two decades ago to seek fame and fortune abroad, is now regarded as a lone, pathetic figure.

Dr. Setitara Miura, her physician husband who refused to divorce her during all the years she was away from him, basking in the operatic limelight, and leaping from one success to another, has been dead these past three years.

Her Italian companion, A. Francetti with whom she traveled in her tours through Europe, South America and the United States, has left her.

In returning to Japan alone, the popular mind sees in her, notwithstanding all her successes, a forlorn woman in her middle ages, beckoned by the call of her native land and her kith and kin.
