## YMCA PLANS FIRST SWIM MEET AUG. 27

### Trophies and Medals To be Awarded to Winners

The local Japanese Y.M.C.A. athletic board has decided to sponsor the first swimming meet in the history of Japanese athletics in northern California. An invitation is extended to all Japanese organizations to participate in the meet which is set for August 27 at the central Y, located at 220 Golden Gate avenue here.

As this is the first attempt and the success depends on how the clubs respond, Fred Koba, director of men and boys' activities at the local Japanese Y, sincerely request the whole-hearted cooperation of all the organizations.

**Age Division**  
The meet will be divided in accordance with age into senior, junior, and novice respectively. The trophies and medals will be awarded to the winning team as well as to the individual winners.

There is a possibility that the Japanese Olympic Swimming team may be secured for exhibition.

This is just a preliminary announcement of the plan, and the details will be published later on. The committee composed of Ted Ohashi, Mike Matsushima and Tsune Baba is busy planning for the event.

**Swimming Health Developer**  
Swimming is declared to be one of the best all-around sports developing health and body. It seems best adapted for Japanese as a competitive sport.

Few examples seem to be sufficient to establish the truthfulness of the above statement. **Adm. Pratt Denies Charges That Kamoi Spied on U.S. Fleet**

"The United States Navy today is scarcely superior to that of the Japanese."

This picture of America's sea strength was given here Wednesday by the highest ranking officer in the navy, Admiral William Veeze Pratt, chief of the Bureau of Naval Operations at Washington.

"While America and Britain have not built ships up to the limit allowed by the London Treaty, Japan has built practically up to the treaty limits," said Admiral Pratt at the Fairmont Hotel.

## CHINESE HIT TROOP SHIP Fighting Rages Near Harbin, Hundreds Flee Area

HARBIN, Apr. 28.—Fierce fighting between Japanese troops and Chinese insurgents occurred today across the Sungari river from Harbin.

The Japanese inflicted heavy casualties on Chinese soldiers of the old Khrin army, but Chinese shells sank a steamship loaded with Japanese troops in the middle of the river.

Tsu Chi-Tao, president of the Examination Yuan, which passes on fitness of candidates for office, is regarded as a leading Chinese authority on Japan.

His Imperial Majesty the Japanese Emperor, whose 32nd birthday Friday will be celebrated with pomp and rejoicing all over the Japanese Empire. In San Francisco a photograph of the Sovereign will be placed for solemn tribute by the local Japanese at the official residence of the consul general from 10 to 11 a. m., and at the Japanese association hall on Laguna st., from 1 to 3 p. m.

## EMPEROR HONORS NATION'S DEAD AT SOLDIER SHRINE

TOKYO, Apr. 28.—Their Imperial Majesties the Emperor and Empress, accompanied by the highest dignitaries of the Japanese court, officiated at special worship, yesterday the first of its kind since 1906, in honor of Japanese soldiers who died in battle for their country.

The ceremony took place at the Yasukuni shrine of the national Shinto temple which crowns the highest hill in Tokyo and where the Japanese believe the souls of soldiers and sailors killed in action are enshrined.

The last previous ceremony was performed by the Emperor Meiji, who in 1906 honored and enshrined the souls of those who died in the Russo-Japanese war.

The solemn Shinto ceremony was the climax of a four day national patriotic religious observance in which the spirits of 531 soldiers who died at Shanghai, as well as those who died in the Tsinan campaign in 1928 and in the suppression of the rebellion of aborigines in Formosa in 1930, were added to the empire's pantheon.

Those spirits added to the shrine today included only the soldiers who fell up to February 10. Several hundred more must be added at a later ceremony.

In 1920 the Indian population of North America was 450,000.

## SAC TO CLUB EXPLAINS REJECTION OF SHOWA CLUB TO TRACK TOURNEY

Franklyn Sugiyama, sports editor, has received a letter from the Sacramento Y.M.B.A. resents that remark made by one of the Showa officials accusing the Wakabasa of being "un-sportsmanlike." The letter is quoted in part.

The Japanese American News San Francisco, Calif. Mr. Franklyn Sugiyama:

In response to your letter asking for information regarding the Showa-Wakabasa affair, the Sacramento Y.M.B.A. presents that remark made by one of the Showa officials accusing the Wakabasa of being "un-sportsmanlike."

**Demand Apology**  
Whether the Showa members derive any personal satisfaction from accusation is hardly the case when the reputation of a club is publicly denounced. The Sacramento Y. M. B. A. cannot and will not remain

in peace until a public apology is made.

In reference to the rejection of the Showa entry the Northern California Olympiad committee, which is a committee formulated by the Sacramento Y. M. B. A. to look after the Olympiad, assumed that the geographical location would be enough to restrict entries to clubs in northern California in respect to the Valley Region.

**Reply to Showa**  
When the entry from the Showa club came the committee felt highly pleased to have the Olympiad merit the attention of the Showa, but having a definite purpose in view, the committee could not accept the entry.

A wire, which was requested by the Showa club, was sent them rejecting the entry and with the intent of sending a letter explaining the reason.

The purpose of the Northern California Olympiad, sponsored by the Sacramento Y. M. B. A., is to stimulate interest in track and athletic events among the Japanese American athletes.

**Showa Might Win**  
The Showa club, as seen by the committee, did not fall into this program. There are many small clubs in and around this region whose number of athletes are limited.

The Showa club if permitted to enter the Olympiad would not find it hard to capture high honors by virtue of her superior number of athletes. The Olympiad committee, sensing this injustice could not do otherwise but reject the Showa entry as it would have done any other club not in the Valley Region.

However, since the Showa club most emphatically insist upon entering the Northern California Olympiad, which is now postponed to Sunday, May 1st, on account of rain, the Olympiad committee has no alternative but to send wires to all clubs whose entries to the Olympiad have been accepted and ask them for their decision as to whether the Showa club or the Valley region shall be admitted or excluded from the Northern California Olympiad. The result will be immediately sent to you when the decision is reached.

**Stars Show**  
Heats in the 50-yards back stroke were won by K. Mushihsima, Hawaiians; Bud Kinoshita, Golden Bears. In the 100-yards breast stroke, J. Kando, Gakusei Kwal, time-1:35; S. Kawachi, time-1:32; S. Tanaka, time-1:41. They will compete in the finals.

## Adm. Pratt Denies Charge that Kamoi Spied on U.S. Fleet

The troubled waters caused by charges appearing in the San Francisco Examiner Wednesday morning that the Japanese Navy tanker Kamoi was a spy ship shadowing the American fleet in this harbor were smoothed over by statements from Admiral V. Pratt, chief of the Bureau of Naval Operations, and Admiral Cole.

"I cannot attribute any such small boy stuff to the Japanese navy," Admiral Pratt said. "We would not do it ourselves and I can't believe the Japanese would."

**Cole Tells View**  
And Admiral Cole said: "The commandant of the 12th Naval District has assured the Japanese Consul General in San Francisco that the naval service is always delighted to welcome Japanese naval officers commanding the Japanese naval tankers and harbors no suspicion of any ulterior designs connected with their visits in United States waters. The visit to San Francisco at this time of the I.J.M.S. Kamoi is merely a coincidence."

## FLIER WILL ARRIVE FOR PACIFIC HOP

Yoshihara to Hop off For Japan by Way of Alaska

Seiji Yoshihara, intrepid Japanese flier who will hop off from Oakland for a trans-Pacific flight to Tokyo via Alaska and the Aleutian Islands during the latter part of May, will arrive at the 3rd and Townsend station Friday morning, 9:15 a. m., aboard the Southern Pacific flier, Lark, from Los Angeles.

The flier, a first-class pilot, will remain in the Bay area for about 2 weeks making preparations for his epoch making flight.

Yoshihara will take the great circle route, stopping at 7 places on the way before landing at his destination, which is Tokyo. His plane is a Saunders-Roe amphibian, the "Cutty Sark," used as a flying boat only, and it is equipped with an Armstrong Siddeley "Lynx" motor of 215 h. p.

After taking off from Oakland, Yoshihara will stop at Seattle, Wash. His next stop will be at Juneau, Alaska. The other stops include that at Seward, Dutch Harbor, Anchorage Harbor, Petropavlovsk in Kamchatka, Abashiri in the Kuril Islands, and the Hocht Shimbu, one of the leading dairies in Tokyo.
