PACIFIC TARIFF BARRIER DEPLORED BY ALEXANDER

HONOLULU, May 5.—Liberating of tariffs that the commerce between the United States and Japan may flourish was strongly urged by Wallace M. Alexander, chairman of the Alexander and Baldwin, Ltd., of San Francisco, in an address delivered yesterday to the delegates of the 69th annual Foreign Trade convention here.

"It is important to note that Japan's luxury tariff is not discriminatory against the United States but applies to identical commodities from all world sources.

"In cases where Japan has made concessions, by commercial treaty to other countries like France and Italy, the United States is given the same treatment.

"Japan-United States commerce will flourish in the highest degree when tariffs of both countries are liberalized. Present free entry into Japan of raw cotton and free entry into the United States of raw silk, suggests the possibility of freer exchange of goods."

NIPPON AND CHINA SIGN WAR TRUCE

Document Approved By 2 Delegates in Hospital

SHANGHAI, May 5.—The Chinese Japanese armistice was signed at 11:45 this morning.

It was necessary to take a draft of the treaty to two different hospitals in order to obtain the signatures of the chief delegates, who are suffering from injuries.

Mamoru Shigenitsu, Japanese delegate, was injured when a bomb was thrown by a Korean, while the Chinese delegate, Quo Tai Chi, is suffering from head wounds after having been waylaid by the Chinese students.

Rain Prevents Riots. The British consulate where the meeting was held, is under heavy guard, but rain apparently prevented mob disturbances.

A Japanese surgeon amputated the right leg of Minister Mamoru Shigenitsu soon after he had signed the agreement. The amputation was successful and the minister is reported in good condition.

The Japanese volunteered to start withdrawal of their troops Friday as the first step in the faithful execution of the agreement. Withdrawal is to be completed in four weeks.

Before he was given an anesthetic he shook hands with Samuel Chang, director of intelligence at the Chinese foreign office and said: "Tell your people we must be friends."
