Korean in Shanghai Bares Bombing Plot

SHANGHAI, May 9—Bomb attacks on Japanese leaders in Japan and Manchuria, similar to that which occurred in Hongkong park here April 29, were predicted today in a statement which emanated from the Korean colony.

It purported to give the true explanation of the Hongkong bombing days ago which resulted in the death of one high Japanese official and in the injury of several others.

It was signed by Kim Koo, a Korean said to be head of the Korean Patriotic society.

Kim said he was the instigator of the Hongkong bombing and that he wanted the world to know the truth, so the Japanese would stop rounding up Korean residents of Shanghai for questioning.

He said he sent Yun Kili, a young Korean revolutionary to Hongkong park that day with bombs and that the young man achieved his purpose. Yun is now in the hands of the Japanese, he said, and may be dead or alive.

BOMB BLASTS BUILDING OF U. S. CONSUL

Consulate Set Afire In Nakasaki by Explosion

WASHINGTON, May 9—The American consulate at Nagasaki, Japan, was bombed this morning.

Henry B. Hitchcock, consul there, sent the state department a message stating the consulate was set on fire by a bomb of crude manufacture, thrown at the office entrance from an automobile.

The fire was put out by extinguishers and garden hose before serious damage was done.

Hitchcock apparently attached no political significance to the incident.

LONDON, May 9—Police were summoned to the Japanese embassy today to drive off a delegation of members of the Unemployed Workers union demanding to see Ambassador Matsuda to protest against Japan's Manchurian policy.

Japanese to Take Census of Wealth

TOKYO, Japan, May 8th—A committee of five members was named yesterday to be in charge of preparations of the third census of the national wealth of this country, which was estimated at approximately 102,000,000,000 yen at the end of 1924 as the result of the last such census taken in 1926.

The national wealth census is taken once every five years, the first having been taken in 1921 to show the wealth of this country as existing at the end of 1920, which was estimated at approximately 85,000,000,000 yen.

The census to be taken this year, which ought to have been taken last year, will give an estimate of the national wealth as at the end of 1929.

The authorities concerned are of the opinion that the national wealth has increased since 1924 due to recent development in the building industry, public utility works, and aircraft and steamship operations, despite the universal depression.

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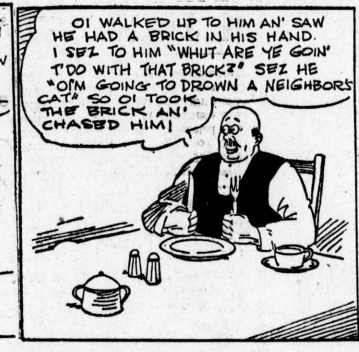
