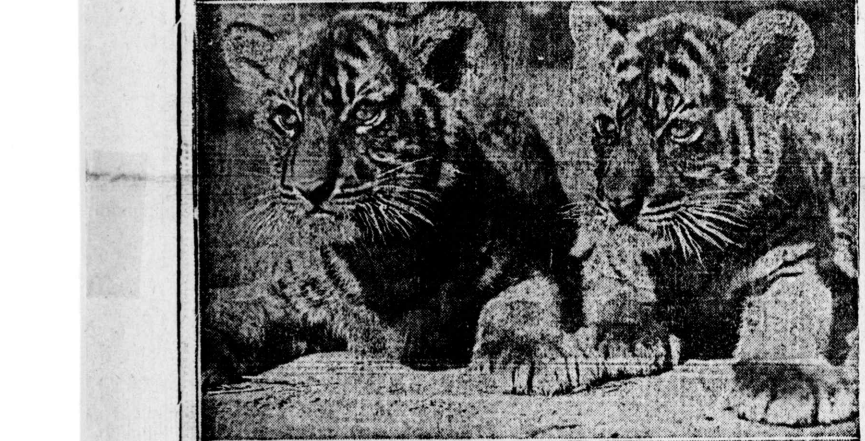

"Through the smother of water and wooden wreckage these horses marched quietly into the under-bridge deck space I had reserved for them. There they stood until their stalls and feeding troughs were erected. And not one was seasick."

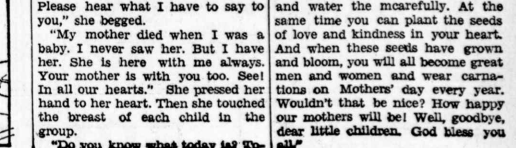
