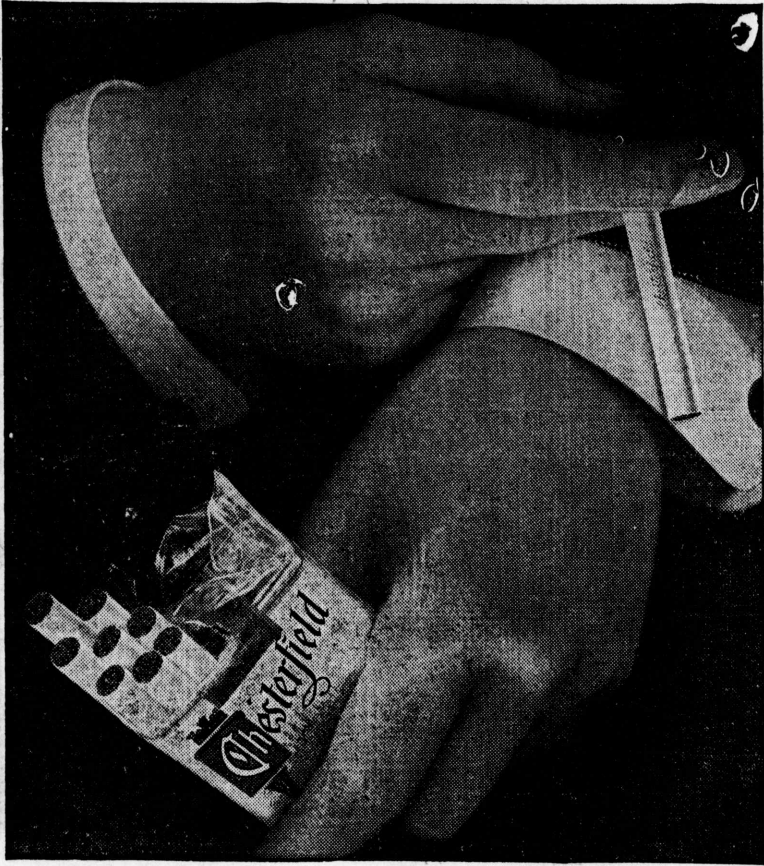

ASSASSINS GANG OF ARMY, NAVY SHOOT PREMIER TO DEATH IN VIOLENCE ORGY

Assassins Tear Into Official Mansion and Shoot Inukai Twice; Gang in Wild Rampage Invades Police Bureau

TOKYO, May 15—All efforts to save his life proving of no avail, Prime Minister Tsuyoshi Inukai died today.

TOKYO, May 15—The life of Premier Tsuyoshi Inukai, 78, was slowly ebbing at 9 p. m. today, despite transfusion of blood given him by Dr. Aoyama, the brilliant surgeon of the Imperial university, at the official mansion of the Prime Minister soon after the attempted assassination which took place at 5:20 p. m.

The Premier was shot twice, once in the right upper cheek and once just below his nose.

TOKYO, May 15—Eighteen young officers of the army and the navy gave themselves up late this evening at the Kojimachi district gendarmes office in connection with the bold shooting of Premier Inukai and the terrorist invasion of the Metropolitan Police headquarters and other startling acts of violence.

The handbills which they scattered while on their rampage declared themselves to be the "vanguard of the people of Japan," in their attempt to throw off the yoke of intolerable corruption in the whole structure of society.

TOKYO, May 15—All hopes were given up at 8:30 p. m. for the recovery of the 78-year old Tsuyoshi Inukai, Prime Minister of Japan, from the grave injuries received three hours earlier when a band of five or six members of the "Death Battalion," tore into the official mansion of the Premier with pistols and hand grenades and shot the aged statesman twice in the face.

The assassins, all young officers of the army and navy, shot a number of police and plainclothesmen who guarded the mansion and cleared the way for the attempted assassination, one of the most dramatic incidents in the history of modern Japan.

At 5:30 p. m., or some ten minutes later, another band of terrorists in three automobiles invaded the headquarters of the Metropolitan Police bureau, hurling hand grenades and firing guns in rapid succession. They rushed up to the third floor, shooting and seriously wounding a reporter of the Yomiuri News and several others. Then they fled.

A few minutes later, the headquarters of the Seiyukai, the party in power, as well as the Bank of Japan and the official mansion of Count Shinken Makino, Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal, were invaded with guns and hand grenades. No serious damages were done.
