

## CITY PAPER HAS NIPPON COMMENTS

### Chronicle's Editorial Scores Japanese Military

The San Francisco Chronicle, commenting on the situation in Japan now, wrote a lengthy editorial on May 18 which is quoted in part: Japanese Nation Comes to Grips With Its Army Lords

The brightest ray in the news from Japan is that the liberals will resist the army's ultimatum calling for abolition of party rule

The outcome is by no means clear. Will it be military dictatorship? In that case let the world beware. Will the liberal leadership of Japan prevail?

Depends on the Emperor The situation depends greatly upon the Emperor, his character and who has his ear. He has an opportunity now, if he has the moral courage, to put his country where it belongs.

Fate of Japan Has the Emperor the force of his grandfather? The fate of Japan, the security of the world hang upon the answer.

What would be the reaction in the United States if the army should announce that it would not support the government? The thing is unthinkable. It could not happen except in a rebellion. It would be a rebellion.

Peculiar Position It is difficult for Americans to appreciate the position of independence power held by the army in Japan. The army can act without reference to the cabinet. It can even act in defiance to the ministry. It can prevent the formation of a ministry.
