Frank Yoshimura Is Cume Laude Man At School

[Special to Japanese American News] VACAVILLE, May 24—Frank Yoshimura, brilliant student of the local Vacaville Union high school, will be awarded the mantle of "Cume Laude," highest honor for the students of the vocational department, at the graduation exercises to be held in the Clart Theatre Thursday evening, May 26, 8:30.

The mantle awarded annually to the junior student with the highest grades, was placed into the custody of Miss Ayako Yoshimura last year. She is the sister of Frank Yoshimura, who won it this year jointly with John Costello. Both Yoshimura and Costello received the same grades.

Presented by Sister

The mantle will be presented to the boys by Miss Yoshimura, last year's winner.

After the notice of these awards was given out by the school authorities, Frank Yoshimura was notified by the principal that he had enough grade points to graduate this year. So, besides being an honor student and the highest ranking student of the junior class, he has completed a four course in three years.

Frank Yoshimura plans to enter the University of California in the fall.

Shirakawa, Reported Dead, is Still Alive

SHANGHAI, May 24—Japanese physicians in attendance upon General Yoshinori Shirakawa, commander in chief of the Imperial army forces, who was reported dead yesterday, said today that he was still alive and had rallied slightly after an operation and further blood transfusion.

The result of the operation and transfusions, which were carried out at 11 a.m., was such as to give some hope he might possibly recover they said.

The general was wounded by a bomb on April 29, and was reported dead yesterday by all foreign and vernacular newspapers here. Later, Japanese officials denied the report, but added that he was sinking rapidly.



If anybody during a ride through the country on Sunday, should have happened to see a company of about twenty trim Japanese in nautical garb entering or leaving a dairy and wondering how come, here is an explanation, and, shipmates all, it is the tale of a sailor man's versatility.

When the freighter Wales Maru of the Kawasaki Kisen Kabushiki Kai came into the San Francisco port the other day from Japan, the local agent said to Captain Itoh:

45 Holstein Cows

On your return journey to Japan, captain, you will carry hence for the Imperial government a consignment of forty-five very valuable Holstein cows, going to the government experiment farm for the purpose of improving our Japanese breeds, as far as you know milk in our country has fallen somewhat below the standard. They will be housed in stalls on the after well deck."

"Yeah?" replied the gallant skipper in the Japanese equivalent; "and who is going to feed, groom and otherwise chaperone said milky cows?"

"Ah, captain, that must be done by your crew. Sailors are very versatile men; they can do anything."

Send For Chief

Then a sudden illuminating signal flew in Captain Itoh's mind. "Certainly," he said, "my sailors can do anything, but they cannot milk cows."

The agent left and the skipper thought long. He would give the farming job to the chief engineer. He sent a messenger to the chief, and told him the whole sad story.

"It is a mechanical operation. I understand, chief!" he said. "Do not milk cows by machinery? Therefore it is in your department."

But intensive inquiry elicited the fact that as milking machinery was not much of a success at sea, the process must be accomplished by hand.

But Captain Itoh was not to be dismayed.

Salomon Better than Cows

"No Japanese seaman is to be frustrated by a mere bovine," he said. "We are here one day and then to Los Angeles, then to Seattle and back to San Francisco. In each port, chief, you will conduct a party of twenty of our crew of forty to some dairy and have them induced into the mystery of cow milking."

So that is why twenty jolly Japanese tarts and officers from theentine room piled into a large motor bus on Sunday and at the evening milking sat stolidly on stools and were initiated into that elusive hand.

By the time the ship sails hence Captain Itoh expects to preside over a crew of expert milkers.
