



不況時の苦難

- 1. 地代高騰による地代負担の増加

- 6. 政府の保護政策による過度の生産抑制
- 7. 工業生産の停滞による需要の減少
- 8. 労働者の賃金の低下
- 9. 地代の高騰による地主の剥削
- 10. 農業生産の技術的進歩による効率化
