MANY MARKS SET IN L. A. TRACK MEET

Spartans Win A Tilts, Harbor City Takes B Division

LOS ANGELES, May 31—Despite unchangeable winds and cross currents that blew in all directions, the sixth annual inter-organization track meet sponsored by the Japanese YMCA of this city, sparkled with brilliant performance as the Fremont high school oval Monday before an estimated crowd of 800 persons.

Watanabe, 16 year old speed king of the Harbor city class bee team, swept across the oval to make a new mark in the 10 yard dash, being timed at 5.4 seconds in the preliminaries, to come within one tenth of a second of the world's record for the event.

He also set a record in the century when he broke the tape at the finish clocked at 10.2. In addition, he tied his old 120 yard hurdle time of 14 seconds flat. Running anchor man on the winning relay team, he made a total of 18 1/2 points to lead the field in digits earned.

Harbor City Wins
Thusly, and with a well rounded team, Harbor city took the class B division with 40 1/2 points to win the pennant.

The varsity division came through with five new records with the best performance established by the lanky timber topper, F. Odanaka, Compton junior college star, who took the 120 high hurdles in 16.4 seconds erasing his old mark of 17.1 and stepping over the 220 low hurdles for another new record of 28 seconds flat.

But Odanaka's records and ten points didn't help out his Anchovie team to win the meet which was won by the Spartans Y club with 31 1/2 points. The latter losing during the earlier part of the day, came through to pass up the Anchovie who garnered 25 points.

Teukahira of Oxy, a new quarter mile mark with 85.2 seconds abolishing the old mark of 65.2. K. Kawa, his team mate hopped to a new broad jump with a leap of 21 feet 9 3/4 inches. The old mark was 20 feet 9 inches.

High Point Men
High point men in the A division were J. Nakamura, Anchovies, Odanaka, Anchovie, Ishizuka, unattached, and Furuhashi, Orange county, all winning two first places for ten points each.

Harbor city came with expectations of a big battle in the class C division, but went home with all the medals and ribbons when they garnered more than two times the points won by all other teams together. They totalled 45 1/6 points while San Pedro followed with 8 1/3.

Hashimoto of Harbor city, he of the long and slender legs established a new fifty yard mark of 5.4 seconds. His team mate took the 75 yard dash in the new time of 8 seconds.

Okura Stars
Okura, junior Olympic title contender, running under the Harbor city colors, set a new broad jump mark for little boys of 19 feet 9 1/2 inches, beating the old mark by 1 1/2 feet.

The other exceptional records were made by F. Arakawa of Spartans in the 8 pound shot put. He sent the pellet for a ride of 49 feet 6 1/2 inches to beat his old record by over 2 feet.

Harbor city's Ishikawa took the high point medal with 9 1/3 points in the C class.
