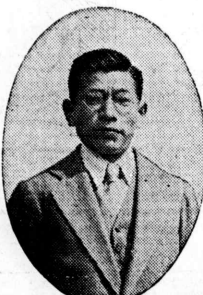

## JAPAN OUT TO SHINE IN L.A.

### Sports Editor of S. F. Paper Comments on Olympic Team

IN A BIG WAY

Following article appeared in the Chronicle of June 10, 1932. Japan is to "do" the Olympic Games in a big way. Not only will that country have practically complete coverage in athletic competition, but they are backing it up by making sure of having the news sent to their home papers.

Three Japanese newspaper men reached San Francisco Wednesday and will leave at once for Los Angeles to report advance happenings and to stand by the job until it is completed.

There is a considerable expense in sending newspaper representatives this distance, keeping them on the ground and paying the cable or radio charges.

It simply goes to show how serious the Japanese are taking this international competition. It is my understanding the Japanese government lends financial assistance, which probably enables the Japanese amateur committee to do things on a large scale.

## STOCK'N TO AID 150 IN FLOOD AREA

### 60 Children Stranded In Venice Island Wash-Out

[Special to Japanese American News] STOCKTON, June 10.—Members of the local Japanese colony are being solicited for funds to care for 150 Japanese made homeless by the flood on Venice Island. Joseph Hikida, secretary of the Japanese Association of this district, declared today 150 men, women and children are living in barns, sheds and corrals on the island levees and are dependent on the bounty of their countrymen to keep them from actual destitution.

Hikida declared today that among the persons stranded on the levees are about 60 children. No effort will be made at this time, he said, to remove the refugees, as they are believed in no danger and all have livable shelter. He also declared the Japanese colony would be able to furnish relief to them from within its own ranks, he believed.

With one row of piles having been driven, pile drivers were today engaged in driving a second row of piles to stop the levee break which has caused the entire 3875 acres on Venice Island to be covered by between 10 and 12 feet of water. When the second row is driven it is planned to fill in between them with brush and dredgings.

Many of the 300 workmen on the island have left, but about 200 workers, mostly Japanese and Filipinos, have remained and are making their homes on the levee near the break. Food is taken to the workers twice a day on Colberg boats. It is expected it will take several days to repair the break, and a month or more to pump the water from the island.
