LYTTON SET FOR RULE BY JOINT BODY

Nippon Is Opposed to Return of Chang to Manchuria

(Special to Japanese American News) MUKDENY, June 17.—A proposal to place Manchuria under the League of Nations' mandate and the jurisdiction of a Sino-Japanese commission to be headed by General Chang Hsueh-liang is being contemplated by the League's commission of Enquiry, following the recent interview by its chairman Lord Lytton and Sir Miles Lampson, British Minister to China, now en route to London. This is the substance of a report emanating from substantial quarters here.

Disregards Republic
Those who analyze the newly contemplated Manchurian mandatory plan are of the opinion that it is intended primarily to strengthen the League position in the Far East by putting the control of Manchuria under the Sino-Japanese Commission and patri to recognize the Japanese prestige by offering the majority of the seats in the commission to Japanese, though General Chang will be elected its Chairman. There is, however, no ambiguity in the evidence that the scheme is contemplated in utter disregard of the existence of the Republic of Manchuria.

Russia May Act
With reference to the situation, it is understood that Japan is adamant in her opposition to permitting General Chang's entry into Manchuria in the capacity of the highest Manchurian official.

At the same time Soviet Russia, which is fundamentally irremediable to the League, is expected not to remain silent, as her interests in North Manchuria would be jeopardized if a Manchurian mandatory such as is desired by General Chang and Sir Miles, were materialized.

VICTORY FOR NIPPON SEEN

Japan Swimmers Will Defeat U. S. Team Says Expert

HONOLULU, June 18.—Confidence that Japanese swimmers would defeat the American team and that Japanese athletes would take high rank in other sports at the Los Angeles Olympic Games was expressed here today by Dr. Tadaaki Yamamoto, general superintendent of Japan's teams.

En route to San Francisco on the Chichibu Maru, Yamamoto said: "Japanese swimmers have grown past the day when they hoped to win at least one event in the Olympics. They have learned to faster and no longer fear the swimming process of Crabbe and Charlton.

"In Takemura, Makino and Sugimoto, Japan has three men who can swim 1,500 meters under three minutes.

For the first time, said Yamamoto, Japan has high hopes of success in track and field events.

"In Nambu," he said, "we have a man who can broadjump over twenty-six feet. Mikio Oda, who won the hop, step and jump at the last Olympics. They learned to swim faster to place high in the marathon.

"Six women represent Japan in track and field. Miss Sumi Watanabe may amaze the sports world. She has run the hundred meters in twelve seconds."

CHINA PLANS TO PRODUCE POISON GAS

U. S. Experts on Way To Aid War Move For Nanking

Crack American aviators, air-field engineers and experts in poison gas manufacture are en route to aid China in preparations for the possibility of war against Japan over Manchuria.

This was revealed here Saturday as a group of experienced aviation men, led by Col. John H. Jouett of New Orleans, sailed for Hanchow, where a modern airfield is to be constructed.

Capt. K. M. Zan of the Chinese army, sailing from San Francisco to report to the Chinese command at Peiping, frankly admitted preparations are under way by China to build up a new airplane service and to manufacture poison gas.

Truth Admitted
China will have the aid of American experts in its war preparations, it was disclosed.

"The news of my mission to China is true," said Col. Jouett at the Sutter Hotel. "I am sorry the news leaked out. I cannot discuss it."

Capt. Zan declared China must guard for possible war.

Heads U. S. Flyers
The engaging of American experts to aid in the aviation and poison gas factory developments is reported to have met no opposition from ecy. of State Stimson.

Col. Jouett was chosen to head the group of American flyers after gaining fame in the United States army air service and resigning several years ago to organize an airplane service for the Standard Oil Co. of Louisiana. Born in San Francisco, he is the grandson of Maj. William B. Hooper, manager of the famous Occidental Hotel before the 1906 fire.

He was accompanied by his wife and mother, Mrs. F. L. Perry.

RIPLEY CITES GIGANTIC ART

Painting 70 Feet by 40 Ft. Executed By Japanese

"The largest picture ever drawn," a painting by the famous Japanese painter Hokusai, was numbered among the "Believe It or Not" curiosities by Ripley Friday in the San Francisco Examiner.

Hokusai's painting measures 70 feet high and 40 feet wide, and was painted in 1817.

The explanation follows: "The gigantic painting was done at Yedo in 1817 on the occasion of the Temple Festival on the fourteenth day of the fourth month. The gigantic figure of Dharma was painted with enormous brushes dipped in work is on such a scale that the design could only be seen by those who mounted with ladders to the temple roof."

5 Million Yen Amount Of Money Flowing To Hiroshima

HIROSHIMA, Japan, June 18.—A total of 5,343,394 yen was either deposited with banks in Hiroshima, Japan, or brought back there last year by former residents of the prefecture now living abroad, according to information released by the local Chamber of Commerce.

The amount includes 2,213,471 yen, which was deposited with the banks, and 3,129,923 yen, which was brought back in person by former residents of the prefecture.

There are 71,970 former Hiroshima residents living abroad, in Hawaii, the mainland United States, Brazil, and elsewhere.
