

Ex-Envoy Ishii Enunciates Asia Monroe Doctrine

(Special to Japanese American News) TOKYO, June 22—Viscount Kikuchi...

Giving an address of welcome to Crew before the American-Japan Society...

Crew, in his first speech as ambassador...

He spoke directly after Ishii had referred to various predictions of a conflict...

"First," Ishii outlined, "if Japan were foolish enough to attempt to unduly interfere in the Western Hemisphere—then war would be inevitable."

Second, if America attempted to dominate Asia. "But I am convinced," he went on, "that America's concern in the Orient is only the maintenance of peace in respect to her treaties."

Therefore the American intervention alluded to above is as highly improbable as Japanese interference in the Western Hemisphere."

Ishii predicted his references to conflict upon this assertion: "A grave situation would be created if the United States ever attempted to dominate the Pacific Ocean and prevent Japan from her pacific and natural expansion in this part of the world."

He added that he believed that such an attempt was highly improbable.

JAPAN GETS U.S. PROTEST THRU ENVOY

(Special to Japanese American News) TOKYO, June 22—Seizure of the Chinese maritime customs in Manchuria by the new government of Henry Pu-yi would constitute a violation of the spirit of the nine-power treaty, it was understood today Secretary of State Stimson has represented to Japan.

It was understood the communication called attention in strong terms to reports that the Pu-yi government planned to establish a customs autonomy, with its own collection service, under a Japanese inspector general.




