BIG COTTON DEAL MADE BY NIPPON

\$2,000,000 Involved in Purchase of Calif. Grown Product

Approximately 100,000 bales of California-grown cotton will be shipped from San Francisco to Japan this fall, according to S. Oshimo, representative of the Southern Cotton Company of Texas, who returned from Japan on the NYK liner Chichibu Maru Friday after closing the deal.

Shipments, via the San Joaquin Valley to cotton terminals on the local waterfront, will commence early in September, continuing throughout the balance of the year, according to Oshimo.

Beside the California cotton to be shipped through the local port, a large amount of Texas cotton will also go over San Francisco wharves, en route to Japan, according to Oshimo. The bulk of the Texas output, however, goes in bottoms direct from the gulf.

Oshimo was enthusiastic concerning the future of the cotton industry in California, and the effect it is expected to have on commerce at San Francisco.

Were San Francisco better equipped with cotton presses on the waterfront, the bulk of western cotton shipments could easily be concentrated here, he said.

TOKYO SITE FOR PARLEY

Pan Pacific Students Conference Is Set For July 29

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, June 24—A Pan Pacific Student conference, with delegates in attendance from Pacific lands, including representatives from some two score American universities, will be convened in this city from July 29 to August 7.

The parley is being called at the suggestion of the Pan-Pacific Students club of Tokyo, formed last November with the assistance of Alexander Hume Ford.

Among the discussions on table for the parley will be the creation of ministries of friendship in the cabinets of each of the Pacific countries.

JAPAN COACH AIRS VIEW ON U.S. SPORTS

Rikkyo Varsity Will Take Up Grid on Big Scale

When Ichiro Kaga, one of Japan's Olympic coaches, heard that Herbert Hunter, America's baseball impresario, was planning to take back a group of major league stars to coach the Tokyo Big Six stars, Kaga was not so enthusiastic about the same idea for Japan track men.

"The coaches now, the old country are fully able to teach the spiked shoe athletes all that they care to know," declared Kaga.

Not Sullied To Japanese "In the first place, the American training would never fit the Japanese psychology. A college man in Japan would not be in shape to compete in any meet either physically or mentally with such light training."

"They must train intensively for their competition. But after the athletes have once gotten in their stride they do not kill them off by heat races like they do in America."

"Of course, Japan is a long ways behind America in track but they are advancing," said Kaga with a happy smile.

Points Out Example "Look at our swimming team. They have been trained for the most part by Japanese coaches and I tell you, they will make America's eyes open when they show their form in Los Angeles."

"Japan's coaches work out their training with the Japanese temperament. Hence, they adopt their own race as well as their other peculiarities. Hence, they adopt their methods exclusively to their subjects."

American track coaching methods, American style of running would never suit a Japanese because of the physical differences in the two people. You'll see it all when they come here," concluded Kaga, "better than I could ever explain."

Likes Football "In answer to the question, 'what are you looking forward to the most in America besides the Olympics?' Kaga said without a moment's hesitation, 'the football exhibition which will take place during the Olympics.'"

Japan is rapidly learning the thrill of the gridiron sport. Rikkyo will take it up this fall on a major scale. Other colleges plan to adopt the game within a year or two."
