Personnel of Nippon Girl Olympic Squad Is Enumerated

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, June 25—The Japanese women's track team called for America on the Tatsuta maru on Thursday for Los Angeles where they will compete in the Olympic games.

The girls who made the trip were Sumi Watanabe, broad jump and sprints, Nagayo Sumiko, 400 m. Doga, sprints, Kyoto Daiichi girls high, Michi Nakaniishi, hurdles, Yamanaoka girls high.

Mitsue Ishizu, discus, Yamanaoka girls high graduate, Masako Maho, (captain), javelin Izo girls high instructor, Taka Shibusawa, try-on, Yamagata girls high.

Mitsue Muraoka, sprints, Aichi first high graduate, Yuri Hirobashi, high jump, Hasaku and Yaeiko Sora, high jump, Girl's gymnastic school.

The outstanding athletes in the female ranks are Maho and Watanabe. Maho, in the pre-Olympic try-outs, tossed the spear 33.20 meters which is just 2 meters or less short of the world's record. Her throw made a new Japan record.

Watanabe has done 5.44 meters in the broad jump, which is a pretty fair sized leap for a woman.

Sac'to Paper Lauds Kawakami's Article

The editorial, appearing in the issue for June 21, is quoted in part as follows: "K. K. Kawakami, Japanese journalist, long resident in America and who will be remembered in Sacramento as a correspondent at some of the late sessions some years ago, has an article in the current number of the Atlantic which Americans will find rather difficult to answer."

"Therein he makes the suggestion that before Americans become too critical of Japanese action in Manchuria, they should carefully study the actions of our own government in Central and South America."

HEAVY TOLL FOR JAPAN IN CHINA CLASH

2,974 Soldiers Dead And 1189 Wounded, Report Shows

TOKYO, June 25—Eleven hundred eighty-nine soldiers of the Empire were killed and 2,974 were wounded bringing the total casualties to 4,163 for the Manchurian and Shanghai incidents and the various campaigns against bandits, the Japan War office announced recently.

The details are shown below: Kwantung Forces Killed, 473; those succumbing to wounds, 70; wounded, 1,156. Total 1,699.

Shanghai Contingent Killed, 541; those succumbing to wounds, 95; wounded 1,789. Total 2,425.

Chientao Expedition Killed, 4; those succumbing to wounds, 25. Total 33. North China Garrison Killed, 2; wounded, 4. Total 6. Total of those killed, 1,020; total of those succumbing to wounds, 169; total of those wounded, 2,974.

Assassination of Late Premier Inukai Dooms Japan Women's Suffrage Move

With the assassination of Premier Inukai, and the formation of a National cabinet, the woman suffrage movement in Japan at present is in a state of complete collapse. The Seiyukai party, of which Inukai was the president, always stood for freedom of women and granting them the right to vote. The Seiyukai during the last few years had woman suffrage as one of its main party planks.

Not only is the National Cabinet a strong barrier to the movement, but the fascistic color, which is prevalent in the country now, naturally would oppose woman suffrage, since it adheres to the old Japanese social customs, based upon the family system, in which women are barred from taking part in the social and political world.

100 TO VIE IN OLYMPIC KENDO, JUDO TOURNAMENT

"Quite true, quite true," interrupted Inspector McGregor. The fume from the inspector's pound cigar had completely filled up the room and I heard two of the listeners coughing.




