In the afternoon there will be an air tournament at the airport. In the evening a Japanese movie will be shown with Naniyemon as benshi.

A stately military parade will be seen Monday morning at 11 a.m., followed by associated organizations procession. In the evening a movie by benshi Naniyemon will continue.

MITSUI GIFT AIDS JOBLESS

Social Welfare Work To Start in Seven Nippon Cities

TOKYO, July 2—There is likelihood of the Government's starting its social welfare work at once with the 3,000,000 yen donated by the Mitsui House, in commemoration of the 30th anniversary.

Seven cities, Tokyo, Kyoto, Osaka, Yokohama, Kobe Nagoya and Fukuoka and their vicinities, where the unemployment situation is worst, will be given preference in the enterprises to be started.

It is understood that the entire amount of 3,000,000 yen will be used, in the face of the prevailing acute state of affairs, instead of mere utilizing the interest money yielded by the fund.

Tokyo YW Launches Drive for Lake Camp

TOKYO, July 2—The camp committee of the local Y.W.C.A., Surugadai, Kanda, Tokyo, is now struggling to raise 5,000 yen which is necessary to complete the building of its permanent camp at the Hirabana Promontory, Lake Nojiri, Niigata Prefecture.

The total expenditure to build the camp, said Miss Emma Kaufmann, General Director of the Tokyo Y.W.C.A., is 15,000 yen of which 10,000 yen has already been contributed by friends of the organization in Canada and the United States.

Nice Location "The Tokyo Y.W.C.A. has found a most fitting spot for building its permanent camp on the western bank of Lake Nojiri and has bought a tract of land covering 30,620 tsubo on which it is to erect a log cabin covering 80 tsubo.

A dining room, an office, a kitchen, a reading room, and about 10 rooms for various purposes are to be in this cabin, while 14 tents will be put up along the lakeshore.

150 Girls To Come An outdoor theatre, an athletic ground, a boat house, and a recreation hall, are planned to be built before next summer.

The camp is to accommodate 150 girls from July 30 to September 1. Each camper is to pay 22 yen for three two-week periods as the camp lacks equipment to quarter more than 60 girls at one time.

It is hoped that the capacity of the camp will be increased to have accommodation for 100 girls at one time in the summer of 1934.

JAPAN TEAM DUE JULY 7

35 Men, 9 Women Will Stop Here on Way To Los Angeles

The Japanese Olympic team, consisting of thirty-five athletes—twenty-six men and nine women—will arrive in the Golden Gate early July 7.

Included in the brilliant array of champions are two present world's champions and four who are conceded an even chance of winning the Olympic championship in their respective events.

Oda Is Champ Among the men will be Mikio Oda, world's hop, step and pump champion; Chubei Nambu, broad jumping champion, and Seichiro Tsuda, Japan's great marathon runner, who was in Los Angeles last summer to study the conditions there.

Led by these eminent athletes, the Japanese track and field delegation hopes to vie with the United States and other leading contenders for the Olympic track supremacy.

A drastic cut of 30 per cent will be in force on all goods, thus attracting a record Japanese crowd from country districts all over California. Mammoth paper caps will flaunt from the house-tops, giving a truly Japanese atmosphere.

Two Athletes Two athletes, Masachi Ochiai of Meiji University, and Riutoku Yoshioka of the Tokyo Arts and Sciences College, are slated to earn their share of glory when the Los Angeles track and field events take place. Ochiai holds the Japanese record of 48.14 meters for the hammer throw, while Yoshioka has consistently run the 100-meter dash in 19.8 seconds. He is also the Japanese 300-meter champion.

The name of Miss Kimie Hitomi, Japan's greatest woman athlete, who died last summer from tuberculosis, will be missing, but in her place will be a youthful girl of 18 who only recently tied the Olympic record for the 100-meter run. She is Miss Sumiko Watanabe of the Nagoya Women's High School.

Three Koreans are on the team. Two of them are marathon runners who placed first and second in the Olympic trials, while the other is a sprinter and middle distance runner.

The girls' delegation will make a strong bid in the field events, but in the track events it will be decidedly weak, except in the sprints.
