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## BIG EAGLE TO DECK SACTO JAPAN FLOAT

Magnificent Creation Is Designed by Artist

SACRAMENTO, July 3—The local Japanese people will present for the Fourth of July grand parade here a magnificent floral creation, 24 feet in length, depicting a gigantic American eagle with outflung wings and clutching a huge cliff.

Beneath this bird is a miniature scene of the first creation of the American flag, grouped around several Japanese girls in pretty colonial costumes. Over them on the wings of the eagle will flutter the Star and Stripes of the American flag.

The float, designed by Sosan Watanabe, an artist, is of striking beauty and is expected to be greeted with warm praise when it is led in the grand march on Independence day.

## Hospitality Body to Fete Japan Athletes

Members of the hospitality committee of the San Francisco Junior Chamber of Commerce will greet nearly a hundred athletes, the first contingent to arrive from the Orient for the Olympic Games, when the N.Y.K. liner Tatsuta Maru docks Wednesday.

The party consists of athletes from Japan, with others from India, Hawaii and the Philippines Islands. India's great field hockey team will be among the athletes, according to James L. Callan, chairman of the hospitality committee.

The athletes will be paraded up Market street in automobiles to the City Hall, where they will be welcomed by Mayor Rossi, Police Chief Quinn and other officials.

SACRAMENTO, July 3—Joe Teiken, the Japanese Typhoon, wrought destruction in his customary manner, battering the highly touted Manilan, Pancho Villa, from pillar to post, taking eight of the ten rounds to decisively outpoint Villa but Ed Burns, the referee, with the blindfold that is common to his type called the bout a draw.

Teiken was so far ahead of Villa that two-thirds of the Filipino gallery left their seats at the end of the ninth round, anticipating a victory for Joe.

When Burns lifted up both hands indicating a draw, the air was rent with cries of boo from all sides. Even Villa's seconds and manager looked happy when the referee declared the decision to be a draw.

Joe looked best in the sixth round, flooring the Manilan with a powerful right. However, before the referee could lift up his hands to begin the count, Pancho was up on his feet and in the fray.

Again in the seventh canto, Teiken cornered Villa and showered him with blows, but the Gods were with the Filipino, for he bounded back and forth on the ropes bobbing and weaving to escape most of Joe's punches.

The eighth, ninth, and tenth rounds were very much the same. Joe chased the tired, winded Villa all around the ring but the wily Filipino managed to escape a sleep walk.

Villa countered about once to Teiken's six or seven socks.

Even George Blake, who worked as the third man in Reno and was a ring side spectator, was reported to have said that Joe had a clean-cut decision over Pancho.

About 8,000 fans were present at Moreng field. There is a rumour that Joe will fight Villa at the Oakland auditorium in a re-match.
