(Special to Japanese American News) WALNUT GROVE, July 7.—Three major attractions lured thousands of Japanese people for miles around for the Fourth of July celebration held in the local Japanese community Monday.

Japan Tankmen Hold Trial at North Beach Pool

Looking over the pick of Japanese athletes on the Tatsuta maru as she came into the harbor Wednesday afternoon, they looked more like lounge lizards or matinee idols wearing white pants, blue coats with a square miniature of the Japanese flag.

But taking another look at them in their workout at Kezar Thursday, they appeared to be the real thing. Every man seemed to be complaining of cramped muscle and a giddy feeling due to their long trip.

Plenty of Drive However, Chihet Nambu, Japan's jumping star, took one trial leap after a lengthy warm up. Despite his sea sickness or call it what you will, he got off a jump of 24 feet. Nambu starts from well back of the take off, over 100 feet.

He jogs along easily at the start but breaks into a full sprint at the last 25 feet giving him the momentum to make his leap. His powerful leg muscles gives him a spring that makes him a world champion.

Mikio Oda, hopstep and jump titleholder, did not take off his sweat pants. He was busy flitting here and there directing the activities of his team mates.

Rivals For Venke

Leading the Japanese sprint race is little Ryutoku Yoshioka, holder of Japanese records of 10.5 seconds for 100 meters and 21.3 seconds for 200 meters. Yoshioka is the lad who defeated America's George Simpson in Japan last year.

A rival for Genzeze Venke at 1,500 meters will be found in Seichiro Tsuda who has been clocked in 4 minutes 2 seconds for the distance. He is also rated the Island Empire's best 10,000 meter and marathon runner, having placed sixth in the latter event at the 1928 Olympics.

Other Stars

Among other stars of Japan are Shoichi Mizoguchi who runs 400 meters hurdles in 56 seconds; Nakajima, clocked at 49 seconds for 400 meters; Kinura, a high jumper, and Miki, high hurdle ace.

The swimmers went through a series of starts at the North Beach playfield where the fans were visibly impressed at their ability.

Y. Tsunura, Olympic breast stroke champ, showed much of his old time form. Y. Kikumura, a 14-year old school boy, showed a lot of form.

Yokoyama Fast Outstanding in aquatic events is Takashi Yokoyama, 800-meter free style star, who downed "Buster" Crable and Ted Wiget on that occasion in 10 minutes 23.2 seconds. A 17-year-old star who is regarded just as highly as Yokoyama, is Shozo Makino, who recently established a mark of 10 minutes 16.8 seconds for that event.

Cochi Matsuzawa declared, "from the 100 meters up in the speed event, Japan was never in better condition to cop the aquatic championships at the Olympics."

Plenty of Material

An idea of Japan's strength can be gained from the fact that a half dozen men have been brought over for the 100 meter event of which 3 will be selected for the Olympics at a trial early in August.

Even K. Takahashi, who finished third in the century at Amsterdam, may have to look in from the outside as he was defeated in the pre-Olympic trials in Japan.

ROW JAILS S. F. YOUTH

Takahashi, 23, Faces Charge of Attempt To Murder

Charged with attempt to murder, Kyotaro Takahashi, 23, is today in the city jail in connection with the terrific fight he engaged with Hajime Komatsu at Komatsu's home, 2324 Washington st. Monday morning.

At a preliminary hearing before Judge Steiger's court Thursday, Takahashi's trial was set for August 10. Takahashi was arrested by police in a Bush st. residence near the Japanese community.

Falling to produce the required \$10,000 bond, he was detained by the police.

In the fighting Monday morning over a minor money dispute, Takahashi inflicted some 40 knife wounds on Hajime Komatsu. Komatsu is a graduate of the Heald's Business college.
