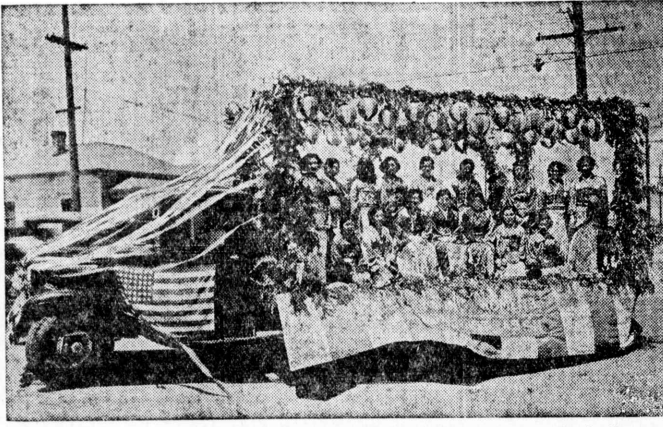
150 For Campfire

Gold Rush Starts in Japan As Gov't Offers High Price for Idle Bullion

Since the government began buying gold bullion on March 18 in order to settle the international account, no less than 27,000,000 yen worth of gold bullion was bought up to May 31, and by June 18 the government bought additional 39,000,000 yen.

FRESNO GROWER LAUNCH DRIVE FOR LIGHT WINE

FRESNO, July 8—"Equal consideration" for light wines in any temporary prohibition modification program was demanded by the California Vineyardists association, a body boasting of a large number of Japanese growers, in a telegram sent yesterday by its managing director, Donald D. Conn, to California senators and representatives at Washington, D. O.

California's \$300,000,000 grape industry is alarmed, Conn revealed, because various modification measures now proposed call only for beer.

Conn asked united California support in Congress to obtain permission to manufacture light wines, which he said would not only eliminate the grape surplus but would immediately add \$300 per acre to land values and result in a turnover of half a billion dollars in buying power to California communities and industries.

MOVE TO BAN ASIATICS ON IN DOMINION

Replacing of Asians With White Labor Urged in B.C.

VANCOUVER, July 8—The Provincial government of British Columbia is considering driving Oriental workers out of industrial positions and replacing them with Caucasians, as a last resort to alleviate the intensified depression.

At the same time, the Seamen's association is manoeuvring to remove all Oriental crew members from vessels flying the Canadian flag.

Despite the fact that Canada's depression is more and more keenly felt and the number of the unemployed is increasing every day, the Dominion government is hampered by insufficient firm funds.

The problem among the resident Japanese, being no better off than others, are receiving aims from the government.

The deplorable situation has prompted immigration authorities to ways in an effort to lessen the unemployment. Since January this year, nearly 500 Japanese have been deported on the charge of having smuggled themselves into Canada.

The paper industry, which caters strictly to Japanese trade, has been severely hit by the adverse sea quotation on this side of the Pacific. As the result, a great many mills have suspended operations.

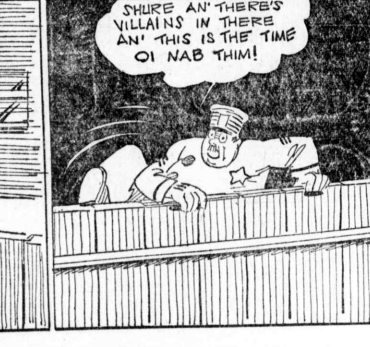
Youth in Stockton Returns With M.A.

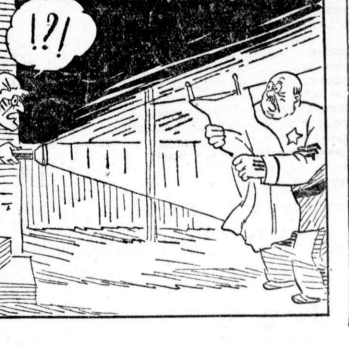
