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## HUGE CROWD IN L. A. GREET JAPAN TEAM

### Tokyo Seek Olympiad In 1940, Declares Nakazawa

LOS ANGELES, July 9.—Japan's second group of Olympic athletes arrived here Saturday from San Francisco on the Tatsuta Maru. The squad was welcomed by several thousand enthusiastic members of the local Japanese community, who escorted the men to their quarters in the Olympic village.

That Japan will make a determined challenge for premier honors at the Los Angeles games is the opinion of all sports observers. The island empire has prepared with typical painstaking care, sending experts ahead to measure tracks and swimming pools, study housing conditions, and analyze climatic variations.

"The rise of national sport in Japan, the comparative proximity of Japan to the Western Coast of the United States, and the desire of Tokyo to stage the 1940 Olympiad are some of the reasons for our large delegation," said Dr. Ken Nakazawa, Japanese Olympic attaché.

210 Athletes Coming Today's Japanese arrivals consist of twenty-two track and field men, and twenty-two swimmers, the remainder being officials headed by Dr. S. Kishi, president of the Japanese Amateur Athletic Association and member of the House of Peers. Japan's equestrian team arrived several weeks ago, and together with a second large delegation due July 18 will bring Nippon's total to 210, second only to the United States in size and athletic ability.

## HEROISM OF PILOT TOLD

### Gift Brings Memories Of Campbell In Japan War

TOKYO, July 9.—Twenty eight years after the sinking of the Hitachi Maru, this disaster, renowned as one of the sad incidents of the Russo Japanese War, was brought back to memory by the gift of a soldier in the Imperial Guard regiment. The officers of the Hitachi Maru, it will be recalled, were Englishmen engaged by the Nippon Yusen Kaisha. They lost their lives in the Genkai-nada, sharing the fate of numberless Japanese naval officers and men. John Campbell, captain of the ship, was the only one to survive against an enemy that was so close that there was no other way to sink the craft.

One Is Saved One member of the crew was miraculously rescued. He is Yoshiji Ohara, a retired corporal of the Japanese Army. Some years ago he wrote a letter to the widow of the captain who was asking out a scanty living in Darlington with an allowance of ten shillings a week. Last year, Mr. Ohara had occasion to recount the story of the sinking of the Hitachi Maru, and the painful condition of the bereaved family of Capt. Campbell, in a talk to the Imperial Guard regiment.

Encloses 3 yen Recently, he received a letter from a soldier through the ex-soldiers' association. The letter reads: "Please send the three yen enclosed in this letter to Mrs. Campbell. This is the savings from my scanty income."

Mr. Ohara, deeply moved by the sympathy of the soldier, asked the British Ambassador here to send the sum to the widow. At the same time he searched for the anonymous soldier. He was found to be Isaburo Nakamura, first-class private of the Imperial Guard Regiment.

## ALLEYES ON JAPANESE AQUATIC ENTRIES FROM SUNRISE EMPIRE IMPRESSIVE

Watch the Japanese swimming team seems to be the slogan of American, France, Germany and other nations who have their eyes on the coveted aquatic honors at the Los Angeles Olympic games. Japan will bear watching. Casting a critical eye over the swimming squad that visited here a few days ago, they looked impressive in their workouts at North Beach.

Japan in 1,500 Meter The 1,500 meter event should be Japan in one, two or three order. Their leading acts in this event are Kiyoko Kitamura, a 14 year old school boy, who has cleaned up in almost every race that he has entered at this distance.

Right behind him are Shozo Makino, Takashi Yokoyama, Torao Takemura and Gen Ishiharada. In other words, Nippon has a quintet of performers who can negotiate the 1,500 meters in less than 20 minutes, which is close to the world's record.

Kiyokawa Threatens Another race that looms bright to the Hinode squad is the 100 meter back stroke. George Kojac U. S., Stephen Barany of Hungary and Seiji Kiyokawa will be the principal actors in this drama. These men have shaded the world's record a number of times. Indeed, when the final swim it out, a new record may be established.

Japan hopes to knock over first in the 200 meter breast stroke event. Her strongest threat is Relzo Koike, who has been showing great form, defeating Yoshiyuki Tsuruta, the present Olympic champion in that event. Shigeo Nakagawa is another strong threat.

800 Metre Relay This race is, of course, the most important event on the aquatic program. It is expected that the winner of this event will eventually be the 1932 aquatic champion. The two leading contenders are Japan and the United States. The prospective standings may end something like this: 100 metre free style: Hungary 4:00 metre free style: France 1:50 metre free style: Japan 1:00 metre breast stroke: America 2:00 metre breast stroke: Japan 800 metre relay: America or Japan Fancy Diving: America High Diving: Egypt Water polo: Hungary. The scores would stand: America—2 Japan—2 Hungary—2 France—1 Egypt—1 The relay race therefore is the question.

Japan has the best probable chance, judging from the above analysis, for should she win in any of the three doubtful races, namely the 400 metre free style, the 100 metre breaststroke conceded to America, and the 800 metre relay, she will be the champion.

If Japan should win the 400 metre free style and the 800 metre relay, she will win by a two point margin.



## JAPAN PLANS HUGE BRIDGE

### Shimonoseki Span to Require Cost of 25,000,000 Yen

TOKYO, July 9.—The much-discussed suspension bridge across the Shimonoseki strait, connecting the mainland of Japan with the island of Kyushu, will become a fait accompli within a few years.

The 30,000 yen appropriation for preparation having been approved by the Diet in its recent special session, the Home office will begin studying the technical details of the proposed span.

The basic plans drafted by the Civil Engineering bureau call for erecting the bridge across the narrowest part of the channel, known as the Hayatomo narrows. The entire span of 1,900 feet will be supported at both ends by two steel abutments, each towering 320 feet above water.

The construction work probably will be started about April, 1933, and will be carried out according to a three year program at a total estimated cost of 25,000,000 yen.

## TOT'S LEG BROKEN BY HITRUNNER

### Brave Sac'to Boy, 5, Crawls Home After Painful Mishap

SACRAMENTO, July 9.—With Spartan-like spirit, a 5-year-old Japanese boy Thursday crawled nearly a block to his home with a broken leg dragging behind him after he had been struck down by a hit-and-run motorist.

Despite the excruciating pain, the child fought back the tears and in the torturous journey to his home he gave no indication to passerby he had been injured. Apparently believing the child was only playing, many passed him with only a glance.

Child Doesn't Whimper As he crawled on the front porch of his home at Second Street, the boy, Koichi Tanji, called to his mother. Without even a whimper to betray the pain he was suffering, the child told his mother a truck had struck him down near Second and O streets.

The mother summoned neighbors and the boy was taken to the emergency hospital. With his leg below the knee broken in such a manner as to represent a U. child only gritted his teeth and clenched his tiny hands when the doctor set the bone.

Tells Of Accident. Today, Captain Fritz Kaminsky of the police traffic bureau visited the boy in the Agnes Hospital and questioned him concerning the accident. With the calmness of an adult the child described the accident.

He told of running into the street and the truck bearing down on him. When the fender of truck struck him down he quickly sat up without crying or uttering a word. He said the truck, occupied by three "black men," stopped a short distance away and then continued on.

The child then crawled home.

Junior— Coopey! Before our chitter-chatter overflows into other parts of English Section let's say 'bye.


