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## GIRL ACES SHOW SPEED IN WORKOUT

### Track Team Trains at Kezar, Mermaids at Fleishhacker

Japan's feminine track aces staged a brief workout Saturday forenoon at Kezar before a handful of fans. Their workout was merely stretching their limbs after their long sea trip.

Nakanishi, 80 meter hurdle entry, showed a lot of speed and class in her starts. Her running was confined to taking a few leaps over the barriers to loosen up. She displayed nice form.

T. Takata, women's coach, considers Nakanishi to be one of Japan's best bets to win in the Olympics. Her best time is 12.2 seconds, which is not bad for a girl hurdler.

Watanabe, sprint luminary, burned the Kezar track in a couple of starts, showing the speed that made her the sprint champion. Together with Maho, javelin hurler, Watanabe and Nakanishi will be expected to earn the major share of Nippon's points.

The women swimmers practiced at Fleishhacker pool before a big group of admirers but limited their efforts to paddling around after taking a few starts.

Taken as a whole, the women athletes did not show the pep and dash that the men showed a couple of weeks ago at Kezar. Perhaps, being women, they did not stand the rigors of their trip as well.

"We do not expect much from our swimming team," declared Den Sugimoto, women's aquatic coach, "because it is the first appearance of our girls in the big Olympic meet."

"Since we have to make a start some time and learn, we brought the women over so that they could observe and learn what the other countries are doing," concluded Sugimoto.

The other men's team also put in a few training ticks to loosen up their muscles. The gamesmen went across the bay to Oakland to row. The boxing and wrestling team trained at the Kezar Pavilion.

The whole squad left Sunday morning for Los Angeles on the Taiyo maru at 8 o'clock.

## Japan Athletes Are Praised by Writers

[Special to Japanese American News] LOS ANGELES, July 16—Columnists and sports writers have joined in the chorus of praise for the Japanese athletes at the 10th Olympiad.

The nationally noted Harry Carr in his daily column "The Lancer" says: "All our sports reporters have quite lost their hearts to the Japanese—which, for this reason and that, is just as well."

Yoshioka Sweet Boy "There is a little 18-year-old sprinter named Yoshioka who is just a sweet little boy. The only word of English he knows is 'Winkoff'—the American streak of speed whom he has come over to beat. At this word he brightens and smiles all over."

Sid Ziff, famous sports writer, in an evening paper, says of the Japanese newspaper photographers who are making the European contestants pose: "On the other hand the boys from the Far East will bend backward to oblige you every request. The Japanese athletes were particularly gracious in this respect. But maybe it is because Japan is another camera conscious nation like the United States."

"When the press photographers unlimbered their batteries on the Japanese, the Japanese did likewise on the cameramen. It was a mutual exchange of pictures."

## 30 Sac'to Baptists Enjoy Weenie Fete



## SPORTS CRITIC PRAISES NIPPON'S SPRINT CHAMP

### Fresno Clubs Plan Movie Show Sunday

LOS ANGELES, July 16—Takanori Yoshioka, Japan's premier sprinter, Saturday served notice that he will be one of the "men to beat" in the Olympics, when he flashed over a 100-meter course at San Pedro High Schools in 10.7 s., only one-tenth of a second slower than the Olympic record and three-tenths back of the accepted world mark.

Out of his holes with terrific speed Yoshioka zoomed down the straightaway like a flash of light slowed down about ten feet from the finish and was clocked at the amazing time by two watches.

Against Time Not only was it his first test since he left Japan with his mates several weeks ago, but also it was run only against time.

Yoshioka has a mark of 10.6s. for the distance, and has beaten George Simpson in Japan. These two feats have made him universally recognized as a strong competitor in the Games, and yesterday's sensational effort brings him right up into the "favored" class.

Fast Starter The Japanese champion is tremendously fast out of his holes. All of the Japanese runners, at the start, crouch with their bodies pointed into the ground rather than level with it. Yoshioka not only gets away speedily, but he's in full stride within a few steps, and appears to gather speed as he goes along.

Coach Giocchi Koyama instructed his star sprinter to run an 11.3s. gallop. When he neared the finish line, Yoshioka realized he was going too fast, and promptly slowed so much that he almost coasted across the finish line. Two experienced clockers had watches on him, and while the distance may have been an inch or two off, Yoshioka's dash "looked" like a 10.7s. race.

Junior College Yoshioka is 22. He has been running, he said, for ten years, but has been in active competition only a few years, now being a junior in the Bunriki university, the government normal school in Tokio.

His father is a Shinto priest, and his entire family—father, mother, sisters and brother—are enthusiastic sports fans. An older brother is a former national Marathon champion.

While he was in high school, Yoshioka won four events in the national interscholastic championships, capturing the 100-meter dash, the high hurdles, the low hurdles and the broad jump. That was four years ago.

He did not go to the Olympics in 1931.

## True Love Runs True to Form

I Anno, Japan's second best sprinter, who has done 10.7s. in the 200, didn't do any real running, as he is suffering with a bad ankle. He took several starts, and got out of his holes almost as fast as Yoshioka.

All of the competitors gave Y. Nago a wide berth, as the husky hammer thrower was in great form. He had a number of throws over 180 feet.

Coach Koyama almost became a casualty, but escaped without a scratch, when he unwittingly became the target of a javelin thrower who was warming up.

## PROF. BARES RED MENACE TO NIPPON

### Dr. Benninghoff Talks At Commonwealth Luncheon

The Great White Bear of the North, Russia, prowling hungrily around the vast stretches of Manchuria and Mongolia and casting covetous glances even to the radical centers of China such as Hankow, is one of the reasons for Japan's determined stand in Manchuria in her effort to stave off assault on the Japanese "life line of subsistence."

This was revealed by Dr. H. B. Benninghoff, professor in Waseda university, Tokyo, in a luncheon address given Friday at the Palace hotel before the Commonwealth club.

Benninghoff Speaks Dr. Benninghoff said: "Japan, when charged with aggression, reflects that unless she had beat her to it Russia might again form an alliance with China and aggravate another Russo-Japanese conflict over South Manchuria."

"The Japanese insist that the existence of an unstable and disorderly Manchuria is inimical to the peace of the Far East. With Outer Mongolia already in Soviet hands, and with Hankow and nearby provinces threatened with communist revolution, Manchuria could not resist the trend."

"For other than these strategic reasons Japan wants political order and economic stability in Manchuria. Small in area, with a high birth rate, she feels that her only hope of national security lies in industrial development here and in depending on the outside world for resources and for markets."

Manchuria Best Market "America and European countries and their colonies have closed their doors to Japanese immigration, and through high tariffs have greatly restricted her trade. Under these conditions Manchuria furnishes close at hand the best opportunity to secure needed resources and provides growing markets for her manufactured goods."

"Moreover, Japan feels that with a free hand in Manchuria she could, in case of war or other disaster, have a chance to exist somewhat sufficiently unto herself."

## Radio Announcer of Tokyo Visitor Here
