BUDDHIST PARLEY OPENS THURSDAY WITH CABINET MEET AND REGISTRATION

Nearly 400 Delegates Expected for Five Day Session

With scores of delegates already assembled here and other hundreds expected Thursday morning, the first social function of the Buddhist conference was staged Wednesday evening with a welcome banquet in honor of the 14 Hawaii delegates at the Showa Low on Post st.

The conference proper will open Thursday afternoon with registration from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., in the Buddhist temple headquarters on Pine st. Simultaneously there will be a preliminary meeting of representatives of the outside delegates and the cabinet officers of the YMWA federation.

Taira President

Kikuo Taira, president of the federation, will act as chairman.

The conference will be in charge of Miss Fujimoto, with the assistance of the San Francisco YMBA.

Miss Kathleen Tsuchiya, director of publicity, declared in a special interview with the Japanese American News:

"This First Canada-Hawaii American Young Buddhist association conference which meets in San Francisco July 22 to 26, is expected to be attended by from 300 to 400 delegates from Hawaii, Canada, Seattle, Portland, Denver, Salt Lake City, and various cities and towns throughout California."

Tokyo In 1934

"One of the decisions reached at the Pan Pacific Young Buddhist association conference, to exceed expectations, to exert mutual cooperation, and also to provide opportunity for the intellectual advancement of Buddhism."

"The Conference will be a five-day affair, and during the conference a few hours will be given to hold the annual meeting of the North American YMBA league, and the meetings and election of North American YMWA Federation league.

Sunday School Problems

"Most of the mornings will be devoted to lectures by the ministers appointed by the headquarters of the North American Buddhist mission. These lectures deal mainly with Buddhism and also with problems of Sunday school."

"Between these meetings and kōshū-kai, there will be time devoted for discussion period, English devotional services, tea party by Consul general of Japan, for the outside delegates, and a sight-seeing tour."

Friday Program

The program for Friday follows: 8:00-9:00 a.m. registration, 9:00-10:00 a.m. opening service, 10:00-12:00 a.m. opening ceremony and election.

1:00-4:30 p.m. general meeting, 5:00-6:30 p.m. general meeting, 7:30-8:30 p.m. welcome reception to honor entire delegates sponsored by North American federation of YMWA BA.
